Rector's Letter: The Coalescing of Chaos



Here's a question: "How do you manage chaos?" Well, my life is definitely chaotic. The state of my study tells its own story: 'EE', 'Everything Everywhere!' I find that as my life speeds up I make more mistakes, I forget more and I make bad decisions. But I know this is not good for me or for anyone else. Is there a way out of the chaos? Will my mind be better organised? Can I slow down my life to find wisdom?

There has been much talk of 'chaos' in the news, so I couldn't help wondering whether we are coalescing in chaos? Over the years we have not only contributed to chaos, we live in it and we are part of it! This is not surprising since our rapidly changing western culture is making intellectual and social demands on us all. Our lives are consequently subject to increasing (and petty) levels of organisation! As life's direction and purpose wallows in chaotic uncertainty, we may wish we were still children experiencing endless hazy summer days.

I have just finished reading Yanis Varoufakis' book, 'And The Weak Suffer What They Must?' (Europe, Austerity and the threat to Global Stability). I recommend this book to anyone who has an interest in the history of the European Union and the issues it faces. The author's perception of the EU's problems and possible solutions are most interesting. Varoufakis was the minister of finance in Greece and is a Professor of Economics. What struck me about his account is the complexity concerning the EU. Our choice to leave will add yet more complexity. Can economics and history

help with our prediction of life's fortunes post Brexit? Has life become too complex for us to make any sensible predictions? Are we coalescing in chaos?

I know that many of us practise 'stillness' as a way of countering the chaos. Some relax with a glass of wine and some relax in a hot bath surrounded with scented candles. We all have our necessary preferences. I practise contemplative prayer, which is a way of prayer without words. It has been said that the first language of God is silence. Perhaps fewer words will bring less chaos and perhaps more silence will bring a deeper wisdom. Maybe it's time for some voices to be quiet. Now it's time for me!

The Farnhams Village Signs

Whether you are new to the villages or have lived here for years, how much do you know of our local history? Judy Tipping is here to give you some insights.


Discussions started and plans were put in place in 1998 to form the Farnhams 2000 Fund to raise funds for a permanent way of marking the Millennium. By the end of March 2000, following various fund-raising events and donations, sufficient funds were raised to erect two village signs: one for Farnham Common, the other for Farnham Royal.

Artwork for the signs was designed by local artist Ron Whiting, and they were made and erected by local signmaker Ashley Bishop. They stand on Bishops Orchard

Green. Farnham

Royal and Golden Oak Green, Farnham Common.

The name Farnham,



The "Royal" appendage was added following Bertram de Verdon, the Lord of the Manor of Farnham, being requested to provide a glove and support the hand of King William I (William the Conqueror) at his coronation on Christmas Day in 1066.

The design of the Farnham Royal sign depicts the glove, as a symbol of its royal connection, and the Parish church of St. Mary the Virgin, the history of which is difficult to date exactly, although records of incumbents go back to mid-1230. The village pump was the original central water supply for Farnham Royal and a landmark in the village until its removal in January 1972. Fortunately this was reinstalled on Bishops Orchard Green in 1993. The Bucks Swan has been the County emblem since the mid-16th Century, being part of the crest of the Stafford family, Dukes of Buckingham.

The Farnham Common sign also sports the Bucks Swan together with St John's Church, consecrated in December 1907, previously known as the Mission Hall. The connection with Burnham Beeches is depicted by one of the famous pollarded beech trees. Burnham Beeches was bought by the Corporation of London in 1883.

Parish Patch

Brian Bilgorri

It is with very great sadness that we heard the news that one of our councillors died suddenly and unexpectedly on 7 July. Brian was one of our newer councillors but he had already made such a big impact. He championed many causes with great integrity including improving local footpaths and Burnham Beeches. His real legacy, however, will be that he organised the installation of the defibrillators in the villages which is hoped will be available to help save lives in the future. Our sincere condolences go to his wife, family and friends. His contributions to council meetings will be greatly missed.

Open spaces

A working group of the council meets regularly to agree maintenance priorities for our open spaces. These include Ingrams, Boundary and Jubilee Copses; Temple Dell; Kingsway Green and the play areas in each village, as well as St Mary's churchyard. If you see anything that needs repairing or improving or if you have any ideas for new features, then please get in touch. One of the issues being debated is whether to provide an electricity supply into Temple Dell to encourage it as a venue for future events. This would cost several thousands of pounds. We would welcome feedback as to whether you think it is a good idea and what sort of events you might like to see held there.

Trees

We have refined our tree policy, a copy of which is on our website. The main change is to be more robust in dealing with rhododendron, ivy and holly. We continue to adopt the policy of retaining and maintaining our non-invasive native trees unless there is sound arboricultural reason to cut them back or remove them.

We are also very concerned that on occasion unscrupulous developers have been known to take down trees in our parish to enable planning development to take place. So we have agreed to commission a survey of all the visible worthy trees in our parish that deserve a tree protection order and to campaign to ensure they get one. If you know of any trees near you that should be protected then please let us know.

Overgrown hedges

One of the many issues that come our way relates to footways being impassable or hard to use owing to overgrown private hedges, particularly in the side roads around the villages. The Parish Council now shares responsibility with BCC to improve the accessibility of footways for our residents. Last year we prepared and issued – via the Farnhams Magazine – a leaflet to every resident with information on this subject. We would ask that every resident looks at their hedges has them cut back as soon as possible where they encroach on the footways or road. There are formal procedures that we can take with BCC to enforce such cut backs where necessary to ensure safe use of our highways, but we very much hope that it won't come to that.

Registering new rights of way

Councillor Home has agreed to become our Rights of Way representative on the County Council's liaison group. A pressing issue for them is to register new rights of way where unregistered (but well used) local paths are being blocked. 2026 is the final date for registering new rights of way so it is important that if any parishioner feels strongly about this then they should get in touch with the clerk as soon as possible. To register a new right of way, you must put forward a robust case with a substantial number of witness statements and have a small working group to champion the issue. The council is willing to lend its support to any such local cause.

Grants

The council has adopted a new grants policy. If you'd like to apply for monies to assist with an event or project to benefit the community then please look at our policy which is on our website.

And finally a message from one of our residents following an unfortunate accident on the Kingsway in early June. She asked me to pass on the following message

"Thank you to all the kind people who stopped to help my husband who fell off the kerb in his wheelchair in Kingsway on 2 July. It is lovely to know there are such caring people in our community."

Bishop Steven rededicates St Mary's Church Farnham Royal

On Sunday 11 June, our new Bishop of Oxford, the Rt. Rev'd Steven Croft, visited to rededicate St Mary's after major interior works had been completed. He gave thanks for all that has been accomplished and offered prayers for all that is to come. His sermon reminded those present that the completed works were 'Good News', for both retaining the historic character of our listed building, and creating a pleasing environment to ensure that children are more central to the future life of our church.

Clearly church buildings and church people must change to meet the challenge of our times if there is to be any relevance. Our old ways must be laid to rest and the new must rise and be owned. To begin this challenge, we made the decision to renew the inside as the place for worship and prayer in the

21st Century, but also to retain all the historic features in keeping with the Listing.

The small reordering committee led by Jerry Houdret began planning the current works in 2014, after a previous reordering committee's design had been turned down by the Diocese as unsuitable.

With Diocesan and Listed Buildings approval for the changes, the actual works were completed by October 2016, with Jerry supervising many of the jobs under the direction of a Construction Design Manager. As well as providing leadership in restoring the church tower roof in 2013, and our rare Arts and Crafts clock in 2009, including raising the funds for both those items, Jerry, aided by many congregation members, especially his fellow warden Adrian Martin, has ensured that this final phase of the reordering was completed to budget. This has been a vital step for the mission of our church. We are most grateful to Jerry for his energy and enthusiasm in leading the project. As a result, our dream for a renewed building has finally become a reality.

Bishop Steven said he believes we now have a brilliantly appointed church building where parishioners must re-gather and be Good News for the community. He said this is not







the time to languish in the past but come alive in the present.

Thanks to using the new noise attenuated larger vestry, Liz Glover and Cherie Taylor, together with supporters, have begun some children's mini services, called JAM (Jesus and Me), during our normal Sunday Communion. As St. Mary Farnham Royal has a church school this makes good sense.

Additionally, they have started a free "Drop In" group for all, open to those of any faith or none, every Wednesday morning at 8.45am till 10.15am in term time. Coffee/tea and

usually a biscuit is on offer, and the chance to have a chat while younger siblings of those already at St Mary's School can play with toys. Come and have a chat, make new friends, and be part of our future.

A big and very pleasing feature of our Rededication Service was the broad spectrum of the congregation from babes in arms to folk with Zimmer frames, and from a wide variety of backgrounds. The road ahead is exciting, and our rededicated church building is ready to serve all of us for many years to come!

1957 saw the birth of our fantastic Junior ('Middle') School in the village, Head Teacher **Alison Fisher**. The friends of Farnham Common Schools are inviting you to join in their diamond anniversary celebrations on Saturday 30 September.

The school has educated many of our residents' children and grandchildren over the last 60 years and we would love everyone in the community to come and be a part of the day. It'd be great to see former pupils, staff, governors, as well all current junior and infant school pupils and parents, especially as the schools have come together as a federation under the new umbrella name: Farnham Common Village Schools.



There will be 1950s-inspired refreshments for adults and children, an art exhibition, dance and choir performances by the school and plenty of fun and games for people of all ages. Stalls will also be there selling great value personalised gifts and 'pocket money' toys from the '50s. There will also be a chance to see the time capsule that has been filled with memorabilia from 2017 that each class has chosen – it will be buried in the school grounds and will be opened in a few decades (the actual year of unearthing is still up for debate!!). Another Travel Award for Farnham Common Village Schools.

You will remember in the last magazine our schools were given a national travel award, and it would appear that success breeds success. We attended an event on 6 July in London hosted by the Education Business Awards. Schools from all over the country came together to celebrate their achievements. We were told that there was a record number of entries and the shortlist for 2017 featured over 100 schools from the state and independent sectors. Each of the schools was an example of best practice in their category of achievement, of which there were 23. Our school was shortlisted in the Parking Management and Travel Planning category, together with four other schools. The reasons given for adding us to the shortlist were:

"The school's large on-site car park makes it easier for families to drop children at school and poster campaigns have promoted safety. Since 2012, the school has been encouraging families to leave their cars at home for the school journey, and has succeeded in reducing car use for the whole school journey from almost 68% in 2012 to 36% in 2016."

We were delighted when the school was named as the winner and we received a certificate and plaque from the star of Educating Essex, Steven Drew.

As ever, we could not have achieved this award without the help and cooperation of all staff, parents, children and their families, volunteers and governors. Perhaps we could improve our figures even more in 2017/18. We can but try.



Burnham Beeches Bulletin

Chris Morris is the senior ranger at Burnham Beeches. Here he shares with us the great news of returning species, thanks our volunteers for helping, and invites you to get involved.

In 1880, the City of London bought Burnham Beeches saving it from development. It isn't often that you'll find such a superb example of ancient, semi-natural woodland that is incredibly important for wildlife so close to a major town. The contradictory needs of the two environments provide people with great opportunities to explore a unique

volunteers that we are able to achieve the breadth and depth of things that we do.

Volunteer projects often involve managing areas of young trees and scrub which grew up after management practices changed. In the past, local people turned their livestock onto the site to graze and collected fuel for



piece of countryside, but also present many management challenges in achieving a balance between the needs of both nature and people.

We are fortunate in that Burnham Beeches has a team of staff with the necessary skills and knowledge to manage the many, complex conundrums created by the history and character of the site and the volumes of visitors it attracts – recent surveys showed we have 580,000 visits per year. Each member of the team has a specialist area of responsibility (livestock, ancient trees, filming, byelaws, ecology, information etc.) as well as carrying out the 'typical Ranger duties', but it is only thanks to the support provided by our large group of dedicated

firewood; as the need for this declined and then stopped, young trees and scrub grew up and began to crowd out some of the less aggressive species, many of which are now scarce or absent from the site. The Victorian fashion of planting rhododendron, which spreads easily, outcompetes the more delicate native ground flora, supresses other plants through its toxic leaf litter and can harbour the fungus that causes sudden oak death, has also given our volunteers (like many more across the UK) plenty of work to be getting on with. Over the past 25 years or so, the Burnham Beeches volunteers have done an amazing job of re-opening areas that had been swamped by a sea of scrub and cleared nearly all traces of rhododendron from the site.

The fantastic news is that, thanks in great part to the efforts of our volunteers, species that hadn't been seen on the site for many years are now making comebacks: the fascinating insectivorous sundew that disappeared 40 years ago has returned to the re-opened wet heath; in early July this year, there were several sightings of the silver washed

Volunteers also help with events, walks, distributing maps or suggesting a good walk to new visitors. They help with administrative work in the office, pick up litter, participate in Natural England's captive dormouse breeding programme, or simply act as our eyes and ears, letting us know if they spot a problem on site.



glades; muntjac deer have been common for some time but now roe deer are frequently also seen; and buzzards, kites, tawny owls, kestrels and sparrow hawks can now all be regularly nesting and hunting on site.

Volunteering at the Beeches is not just about the practical projects. We also have a team of 'Eco-volunteers' who help us to survey the developing habitats and monitor for signs of change. This is crucial to not only let us know if things are going well, but also to warn us of any threats like environmental change, erosion and potential damage caused by nearby developments, such as the nearby quarry site. They spend hours on their hands and knees, or looking through a microscope to identify individual species. One project, for example, involves seeking out and monitoring tiny specimens (as small as 5mm) of a very rare moss which can only be found on the roots of ancient beech trees like the pollards on site.

our practical work both at the Beeches and Stoke Common. Volunteering offers a great day out, with the chance to meet new people and take exercise in beautiful surroundings. It's made all the better by the knowledge that you are looking after an internationally important site for nature conservation and helping make sure future generations can enjoy these wonderful places too.

Mid-week tasks take place every Thursday and run from 9am until 4pm. Weekend tasks are monthly, running between 10am and 3pm. You can either stay until lunchtime or for the whole day – it's up to you. There's plenty of tea, coffee and biscuits but bring a packed lunch if you plan to stay all day. All tools and safety equipment are provided but you'll need suitable outdoor clothes, stout footwear and waterproofs.

Our fabulous Village Fete was on 8th July, our Editor, Paula Morris went with her daughter and gives us a review.



Agnes Canning and the Role of the Women's Legion in WW1

Lisa Edwards, of the Centre for Buckinghamshire Studies, discovered the story of Agnes Canning whilst working on the Great War in Buckinghamshire project. The Women's Legion, which Agnes joined, was amalgamated into the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps in February 1917 and the surviving service records give a rare glimpse into the changing lives of women.

I knew that women had been called up for munitions work during World War One but I hadn't realised that thousands of ladies joined the Women's Legion; an organisation created by the Marchioness of Londonderry in July 1915. Women were recruited to work

as cooks and waitresses in army camps as well as gardeners and drivers. and slight she was, One such lady was Agnes what size shoes and Canning of Farnham iackets she wore and Royal. the physical scars she

Agnes. the daughter of Henry and Elizabeth


Canning, was born in the village of Winterbourne, Berkshire, on the 30th June 1890. She was the eldest of three children

and had a brother (Edgar) and sister (Gertrude). Their mother died in 1898 and the 1901 Census shows a housekeeper listed to help look after the family. By 1911 they had settled in Spring Lane Farnham Royal, and Agnes was working as a kitchen

> maid in London for George Dance, a Theatre Manager and Dramatic Author of some repute.

Agnes enlisted for home service in the Women's Legion Military Cookery Section on the 24th May 1917. On her

application she gives her occupation as 'cook', a job she had done for six years. having started as a kitchen assistant.






A worker baking biscuits at an army biscuit factory in Lancashire, 1918. Imperial War Museum Picture Q 28311

After enlisting she was sent to Starhill Hostel in Farnborough. Although not under Government control, the Women's Legion adopted a military style and so like all new recruits Agnes had to complete training that included roll call, route marches and drill

On 1st June 1918 Agnes was transferred to the military camp at Borstal Heath and billeted at the hostel in Woolwich. She was posted to Aldershot in October 1918 and finally discharged from the army on the 19th August 1919 at the Connaught Club in London, then the headquarters of the Queen Mary Army Auxiliary Corps (into which the Women's Legion and the Women's Auxiliary Army Corps had been absorbed).

From the service records I can trace her life through 1917-1919. I know how small and slight she was, what size shoes and jackets she wore and the physical scars she had on her skin, but I don't know what she looked like. From the Parish Registers I have discovered her burial in St Mary's Church Yard on the 21st December 1931, aged 41 years, and I know that she has a marked grave, but there are so many gaps left to fill.



When my husband retired from work, we decided to return to Farnham Common, where we had raised our three children. Our return to Farnham Common went smoothly.

Our original family home had been close to Burnham Beeches where we enjoyed many pleasant walks, as a family with our Springer Spaniels, and with friends who came to visit. We had barbecues each summer when friends and family and their children would join us, and many New Year's Eve parties when the children were teenagers. Most of those teenagers are now parents themselves, and we tease them about the joys in store when their children become teenagers.

The house was set back down a long drive, the garden mainly lawn. Leading down from a small patio outside the lounge were steps and a rockery covered with plants and flowers. At the bottom was a pond, and each spring groups of frogs from Burnham Beeches would come hopping down our drive to spawn. Our children were delighted to see the baby frogs hopping around the pond and garden.

In Australia, we see many kangaroos munching the fresh green grass in our daughter's garden. In spring the Joeys may be seen peeping out of their mothers' pouches. Hedgerley Historical Society

John Lovelock tells us about the treats in store this winter.

We return after our summer break on Wednesday 20 September when **Dr. David Lewis** will present a talk on Medieval Windsor.

Although in many respects Windsor in the Middle Ages was a typical small town, with its assortment of craft and artisan occupations, in other ways it was extraordinary. It expanded during the Black Death when other towns declined, it hosted an extraordinary assortment of high status occupation, serving the needs of those within the Castle, and it was consistently a wealthy place. Windsor was also famous nationally, attracting immigrants from distant parts of the country, whereas all other towns, with the exception of London, drew their population from a radius of no more than ten miles. It became a selfgoverning borough from 1277, although its roots are of much greater antiquity, and can be traced to a riverside site about three miles from the modern town. Windsor's decline in the early modern period mirrored the change in notion of monarchy. the medieval military castle being an incongruous setting for enlightenment princes, who aimed to project an image of learning, refinement and good taste. Windsor has been a castle town throughout its history, and so it remains today.

In 2003 David embarked on a PhD to study medieval Windsor, the first such research work ever completed, with the degree being awarded in 2006.

Post-doctoral work followed with the Historic Towns Trust, studying Windsor and Eton over a longer timeframe, from c. 800 to 1860 and the production of an Historic Atlas. David is currently writing a history of

medieval Eton and Windsor.

For our October meeting on Wednesday 18th October **Sean Kelly** will describe the history of USA bases in South Bucks.

Sean Kelly is author of Home Bases: Memories & Stories of US Military Bases Around London, which looks at the many US military installations located in and around London going back to World War I but particularly during WWII and the Cold War. It is a book that, for the first time, puts the spotlight on the history of many of the US Military's lesser known command and support bases - several of which were located in Buckinghamshire.

There are two special events in October the first on Saturday 21st October when **Christian Wolmar** will present his talk on Global Conquest: How Railways took over the world. Booking required Tickets £5.

Christian Wolmar will take us through the history of the railways, demonstrating their importance in stimulating economic and social progress. The railways changed the world in so many ways but their role has often been underestimated and forgotten. His talk will show just how much modern life owes to the invention of the railways and how they spread quickly around the world transforming people's lives.


Christian Wolmar is an award winning writer and broadcaster specialising in transport and is the author of a series of books on railway history. He is a frequent speaker at conferences and railway events, and regularly appears on TV and radio. He has spent nearly all of his working life as a journalist, and his interest in transport began at The Independent when he was appointed transport correspondent in 1992. He writes regularly for a wide variety of publications including newspapers such as The Times and The Guardian and numerous magazines, such as The Oldie Christian is acknowledged as one of the UK's leading commentators on transport matters. He broadcasts frequently on radio and TV. Among his numerous feature TV appearances, he has been on Coast, Julia Bradbury's Railway Walks and the railway programmes presented by Ian Hislop and Michael Portillo, and more recently the series on BBC4 about how the railways made modern Britain. On radio, he has frequently appeared on Today as well as other news programmes such World at One and World Tonight He features regularly on Jeremy Vine, LBC and Talk Radio.

His history of Britain's Railways, Fire and Steam, was widely praised and in 2009 he published Blood, Iron and Gold, how railways transformed the world. His latest history book is To the Edge of the World the history of the Transsiberian railway, published in 2013. He is currently writing the history of Indian railways due to be published in September 2017.



From the Archives

You may remember, writes **Elisabeth Mills**, that our last look through back copies of the parish magazine ended in March 1950, with considerable worries about the lack of funds to pay for the curate's house in Farnham Common. However, things must have moved faster than anticipated, because in May 1950 we learn the following:

'The priest in charge is now installed in the new house and a very considerable amount of hard work has been done by the men of St. John's in making the surroundings more presentable. Strength to their tired elbows! We are justly proud of the new house and record our grateful thanks to all who have contributed to the materialisation of our hopes and aspirations. We are particularly grateful to the architect, Mr David Hartley, and the builders, Messrs Hartley and Sons, for having done such a magnificent job at such low cost'.

In the April 1950 edition the curate, Mr J C Richardson, now living in St. John's House with his family, gives news of St. John's Tennis Club:

'Mr and Mrs E C Jubb have very kindly offered the use of their tennis court on Tuesday and Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons and evenings to anyone who wants to play tennis. It is suggested that we form a St. John's Tennis Club so that the best

possible use may be made of this offer. There will be a small subscription for members which will be reduced for holiday members. The money so raised is to be given to the St. John's Building Fund'.

Then in June comes the report of the blessing of St. John's House on Sunday 7th May, by the Bishop of Buckingham. The congregation assembled on the lawn and St. Mary's choir joined that of St. John's. It was noted with pleasure that it did not rain!

There is news of the Farnham Common Women's Institute. 'There are now over a hundred members of this branch, of which Mrs. Sanders is president. It meets on the second Wednesday of each month to transact business and enjoy a talk, competition or demonstration. Outings are arranged from time to time to places of interest or beauty. For instance, this month a party went by coach to see over the biscuit factory at Reading, by kind invitation of Messrs Huntley and Palmer'.

The Farnham Common Young Wives' Club also gets a mention. They had an open meeting February when they had a talk giving them 'much useful and time-saving advice on cookery'. Then in March several new members were welcomed and Mrs Pusey 'gave a helpful talk on Radio for Children, stressing the potential value of radio programmes as a source of common interest in the family'.

The year is racing away and we continue to enjoy our meetings with good speakers, and visits to places of interest.

Our August outing was to Bentley Priory Museum and Park, Headquarters for Fighter Command during the Battle of Britain. The Museum tells the story of this beautiful Grade II listed building. Our members toured the museum of memorabilia and viewed the plotting table where incoming enemy aircraft were tracked. Also in August, the W.I. Bucks Federation organised a trip to Lacock Abbey and Fox Talbot Museum in historic Lacock Village.

We enjoy taking part in Bucks County events and were fascinated by the Science Day when the anatomy of a Cream Tea was discussed. Jenny Harper-Jones attended the WI Fair at Alexandra Palace and was delighted to win the draw for a day's tuition at the Royal School of Needlework at Hampton Court. Several of us celebrated the fine weather with a Pimms and tea party at Hall Barn.



How long have you been involved with the library/been a volunteer?

I have always loved reading, but only joined the library in 2014 I quickly found that I was visiting the library at least twice a week. So as I was in there regularly, I thought I might as well volunteer..!

What made you become a volunteer?

I was very impressed by the volunteers, their willingness to engage with people and the way in which they went about helping them.

Why do you enjoy volunteering at the library? What's the best thing about it?

As a volunteer, you are the face of the library, and it is great meeting people and helping them. The library has a thriving children's section and it is wonderful to see children developing a love of reading which hopefully will stay with them all their lives.

Do you do the same shift every week?

My external work is a bit irregular, which makes it difficult to commit to a 2-hour shift far in advance. Insofar as I have a regular shift, it would be Saturday morning. The rota is very flexible to enable volunteers to fit shifts around their own commitments.

What does a typical shift involve?

The basics revolve around issuing, renewing and returning books on the system and to the shelves, signing up new members. The fun comes from the questions that you get asked by the library members: "Do you have any books by......?", "What's the name of this book — I think it's by someone called Smith (or possibly Jones) and has the word "love"

in the title?", sometimes be involved in making this happen.

Would you recommend others to volunteer and why?

Book Review



Carola Donovan shares the book groups later review and invites you to read the next book to be reviewed, even if you can't get to the library

American Author Elizabeth Gilbert is best known for her memoir of a year of self-discovery 'Eat, pray, love' published in 2006 and made into a popular film in 2010 set in Italy, India and Bali and featuring Julia Roberts.

The novel 'The signature of all things' is a multi-generational saga set in the 18th and 19th centuries and tells the story of the Whittaker family. Father Henry born in England makes a vast fortune from the quinine trade in Philadelphia and the Mother Beatrix is Dutch born and very interested in plants. Their only longed-for child, a daughter, Alma is born in 1800 and another daughter Prudence adopted in 1809. Alma is

a plain child, fiercely intelligent who becomes a gifted botanist, forever questioning and exploring but finding love only in later years when she meets talented artist Ambrose Pike.

The novel is 500 pages long, with extensive historical detail and set during the time known as the Period of Enlightenment, spanning well into the Industrial Revolution. Elizabeth Gilbert has an easy prose style and is a natural story-teller with a recognised love for foreign travel and is a thorough and talented researcher. This interesting and energetic story of love, adventure and eventual self-knowledge and belief for Alma, is set in a past where a thirst for new ideas, discoveries in science, religion and social change are well defined and delivered. Much knowledge of this period was gained by the reader without it feeling like a dry history lesson, but delivered with charm and humour.

The Book Group members felt that the main characters were very well drawn and the novel had a strong story line. Perhaps the secondary characters, although amusing, were less believable and in some cases not essential to the plot. The descriptions of the travels undertaken by Alma were delightful, roaming from the glasshouses at Kew Gardens via Philadelphia, Peru, Amsterdam and on to the breathtaking beauty of Tahiti. The detailed descriptions of plants, butterflies and fauna left our members with an urge to revisit Kew Gardens and experience the charm and beauty there, as most of us cannot hope to make it to Tahiti!

The next book the Group will discuss is 'Bel Canto' published in 2001 by another American Author Ann Patchett. Why don't you read along with us and see if you agree with our review, or submit a review yourself!

Local Artist

John Heywood, who lives in Farnham Common, will be exhibiting there this month. Here he tells a little about himself and his work as an artist.

I was brought up on the North Devon Coast, within sight and sound of the sea. The interaction of light on the sea, or on a lake or river, in different weather conditions and different times of the day still holds a fascination for me and demands to be painted.

I have lived in Buckinghamshire for nearly fifty years but I only moved from the Chalfonts to Farnham Common in 2014. Here I paint local scenes of the Chilterns and the Thames Valley, taking advantage of our beautiful local woodland and river scenery.

Our family has had a cottage on the Scilly island of St Mary's since 1990 and I also go to the Greek islands every year - the quality of the light in both places is amazing! So some of my paintings are coastal scenes from Scilly and the Greek islands.

I have exhibited for nearly thirty years now in galleries in Scilly, mainland Cornwall and the home counties. I was elected a member of the prestigious Buckinghamshire Art Society in 1998 and was Chairman of that Society from 2003 to 2005. Today my work is to be found in Europe. North America, and Australia.

I love to paint in the open air on my old French Easel, but this is seldom without incident. One day last summer, when painting by a pond in Burnham Beeches, some little girls came by with their mothers to look at what I was doing. One little girl said that she could not see a duck in my painting although there definitely was one on the pond. I know how strict little girls can be, having one daughter and three granddaughters myself, so, obviously, I had to paint one in!

Recently I decided to avoid the pressures of gallery work and to simply concentrate on two solo exhibitions a year here in Farnham Common, a Spring Exhibition in April and an Autumn Exhibition in September, giving 1/3 of all proceeds to the Thames Valley Air Ambulance.

I paint solely because I enjoy it; I hope that people who come to my Autumn Exhibition (see opposite) will equally enjoy the results!


