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
## **Editorial**

Please keep sending in your articles, pictures and suggestions, we love receiving them.







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


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## Dear Friends

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## **Burnham Beeches Bulletin**

Chris Morris explains how his team are creating veterans for the future.

Burnham Beeches owes its name to the magnificent ancient beech pollards that have grown on the site for the last 500 years or more, but as they inevitably succumb to old age and gravity, there are sadly fewer now than ever before. To arrest this decline, over the past thirty years the staff on the reserve have not only been working hard to keep our remaining trees alive, we have also been creating the next generation of pollards that will become the ancient trees of the future — in around 500 years or so!

The creation of new pollards began at around the same time that work started on reducing the weight of the ancient trees. Other than a few trees that were cut in the 50's (unfortunately not very successfully), the ancient trees had not been cut for well over hundred years or so and there was no guidance or book available on how to cut old, lapsed pollards. To minimise the risk of losing ancient pollards through cutting them, the team first carried out experiments on young beech trees in a plantation in Tower Wood. By developing an understanding of which techniques encouraged the best response from these young trees, the team could be confident in using similar techniques on the ancient ones. Whilst their great age means it is almost inevitable that the occasional ancient tree will still

be lost, we have managed to slow the decline in numbers and encouraged some good young growth on the old pollards. Additionally, the new pollards created in the experiments of thirty years ago, and

around a thousand others that have been created since, are now themselves part of a regular cutting cycle that means they will gradually become he veterans of the future.

Like all the work on the site, that carried out on the young pollards is guided by our management plan. The current ten-year plan is now coming to an end and it will be reviewed during 2019 to assess progress made and highlight any lessons to be learned. As part of the review process a survey project was started towards the latter part of 2018. The site's Conservation Officer, Helen Read, has a team of 'eco' volunteers who have surveyed each of the young pollards, noting if they are still alive, their vigour, how much dead wood they have and if

any are suffering from squirrel damage. This was also an opportunity for the team to add further details to the records for some of the trees. In November 2018 a degree student from Belgium joined us on a four-month placement.

Laura Comhaire has helped with a range of tasks, but as part of her studies she also carried out a project looking at specific features in the young pollards like the habitat for saproxylic (dead wood) invertebrates and the impact of squirrels on the trees. Her surveys and those of

the other eco volunteers will help us make informed decisions on what to include in the management of these young trees for the next ten years.

Whilst management of the young pollards will be grouped in areas, each tree will have a management plan tailored to its individual needs, as is the case with our ancient pollards. This enables the team to maximise efficiency and minimise movements around the trees whilst maintaining the ability to adapt management techniques to the specific requirements of each tree.

Changing climate and the threats from imported disease have also influenced the creation of new pollards; where in the past we may have cut mostly beech and oak as the next generation of pollards, we are now also cutting hornbeam, holly, whitebeam, sweet chestnut and willow for the veterans of the future. In particular, hornbeam and sweet chestnut decay in a similar way to beech and oak respectively and are therefore good 'replacement' habitat for some of the saproxylic (dead wood) invertebrates which the site is SO important. As the year progresses the team will meet with specialists from various fields to formulate the plan, not just for the young pollards but the whole site, for the next ten years. Later in the

year, once the ideas have been drawn together, there will be an opportunity for members of the public to take a look at the proposals and give feedback to the team. We plan to have an article about this process in the Farnham's magazine later this year.





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## Farnham Common Village Schools

In January, they started their topic by coming to school dressed in costume appropriate for the era of World War Two in order to experience a World War Two Day run by the staff. They also learnt what rationing was like in WW2 and how people had to 'make do and mend' and live off the land. In the morning we cooked 'carrot cookies' using available rations. The excitement didn't stop there, however, as later in the week Year Six visited RAF Hendon Museum where they got to experience an air raid and learnt what it was like to live in London during the blitz. They dressed up in real RAF uniforms as they learnt about the vital roles that men and women played in the Battle of Britain and how this was a turning point for the war. Particular highlights included seeing an actual spitfire and getting to sit in a WW2 era plane cockpit.

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## Parish Patch

## FRPC Parish Council for The Farnhams

As we all look forward to Spring with its longer days and warmer weather, **Judith Hall**, Parish Clerk, welcomes you to the latest edition of Parish Patch, taking a look back at what has been achieved over the last few months and saying a huge thank you to a generous resident.

### **BCC Devolution Contract**

It was previously announced that the Parish Council had agreed to enter into a further devolution contract with BCC to protect services such as urban grass cutting, hedge cutting, siding out overgrown footpaths, clearance of Rights of Way and the maintenance of street furniture, for four years to March 2023. Unfortunately, the Parish Council was subsequently advised that BCC had changed its mind following the unitary authority announcement and would now issue contracts for only one year. Whilst this is extremely disappointing the Parish Council has been working hard to put in place service contracts that will ensure that these services are protected and improved until 31 March 2020. A greater emphasis will be placed, within the contract, on performance management to ensure that the Parish Council and ultimately the residents are receiving the very best service from our contractors.

## **Emergency Plan for Illegal Encampments**

The Parish Council has now formulated an emergency plan for dealing with illegal encampments and entered into an agreement with an experienced enforcement company which means that, if an encampment is set up on land owned by the Parish Council, we will be able to ensure that it is moved on in a swift but ethical manner. Where an encampment is on land owned by a third party, such as South Bucks District Council, we will be strongly recommending that they utilise the services of our chosen company.

### The Mound - Farnham Royal Playing Fields

At the end of last year, plastic membrane, rubber matting and 20 tonnes of topsoil were moved into place to rebuild the mound in the

playground. It is hoped that this spring will see this muddy pile transform into a wonderful feature that can be enjoyed safely by many of our younger residents.

## Dog Waste Bag Dispensers – Farnham Common Sports Club

Farnham Common Sports Club is a wonderful open space and sports facility, which is enjoyed by many residents and visitors. Whilst the majority of users are responsible, there is a small proportion who unfortunately spoil the enjoyment of others by failing to pick up after their dogs. The health issues associated with dog waste are well documented and, following a request from the Club, the Parish Council agreed to install four dog waste bag dispensers. These dispensers have been purchased in an effort to assist and encourage all dog walkers to act responsibly to ensure that this excellent facility is safe for all to use.

### **Verges**

At the beginning of the year, work was undertaken to cut back hedges at various locations in the Farnhams with a view to reinstating verges to improve not only the look of our villages but to also improve safety for both road and footpath users. As with all things, should you become aware of other areas requiring such action, please let me know.

## **Neighbourhood Plan Steering Group**

Whilst in the early stages, work has commenced on formulating a strategy for progressing the Neighbourhood Plan. It is my understanding that an initial questionnaire will be issued to all residents in the coming months and I would urge as many of you as possible to take the time to get involved and reply.

### Streetlighting

Last year, in just one month, the Parish Council incurred costs totalling over £1,100 in fixing two streetlights. One had been hit by a vehicle and the other had been shot by an air rifle. The streetlights in our villages are an extremely important fixture and repairs such as those outlined take time to arrange, often causing inconvenience to residents and footpath users. Whilst I appreciate these are the actions of only a few, I would ask for care to be taken by all as these are funds that cannot now be used to improve facilities for the community.

## **Kingsway Green**

You will have seen an addition to Kingsway Green in the form of a teak bench around the oak tree. Your Parish Council received and approved a request for the installation as a memorial to Anna Morrell, a long time resident of Farnham Common. It is a gift to the community from the Morrell family with the

hope that it will be of service for many years to come.

A family member writes: 'Anna Morrell who died on 26 May 2018 aged 80 had a varied and successful career as a dancer, actor, theatre critic, journalist, entrepreneur and director of the Theatre Royal Windsor. In between she raised three sons who attended Caldicott. Her personality and enthusiasm were infectious and won her many lifelong friends. She was adored by her family.'

The Parish Council sincerely thanks the Morrell family for its donation of such a beautiful bench.

## What makes Speciality Coffee so Special?



The next time you have a cup of coffee, take an extra moment to appreciate the people whose hands and passion produced the cup you're enjoying. If you're drinking a single-origin speciality coffee, appreciate the three degrees of separation between you and the origin of your coffee and the personal relationships between farmers, buyers/importers and roasters. Speciality coffee is very personal. Access to expertly roasted coffee is not just the privilege of speciality coffee shops and cafés. Micro coffee roasters are popping up in neighbourhoods all over the country, eager to please their local communities with freshly roasted speciality coffee and make your connection to coffee a little more personal.

At its heart is a social consciousness, an awareness and a sense of responsibility. In particular, importers/buyers work very closely with the coffee farmers to sustain and improve the quality of their crops, improve their processing methods and engage in many charitable community projects to improve the wellbeing of the farm workers. Everyone in the coffee value chain accepts the premiums paid for speciality coffee to support these goals. The roasters will select single-origin coffee beans that are graded 80 points or above on a 100-point scale as determined by the Speciality

Coffee Association (SCA). Coffee roasting is an art that requires a high degree of knowledge and experience to produce speciality-level roast profiles and to ensure the highest standard of quality and flavour come through in the final roasted bean.

Once the speciality coffee beans reach your local speciality coffee café, the barista is the final coffee professional to complete the lifecycle of the speciality bean. They are deeply informed as to the origin of the coffee bean and how its flavour profiles will be revealed in brewing and ensure each bean reaches its full potential.

As a consumer, by supporting your local speciality coffee roaster or café, not only are you making a commitment to a higher standard of quality of taste and flavour, but also a commitment to a higher standard of living for every person who contributed along the way.

Roast Lab Coffee Roasters (www.roastlab.coffee) are a family-run micro roastery in Farnham Common roasting a selection of single-origin coffees. Because they roast in small 2kg batches, they are able to roast to order and accommodate personal preferences. They offer beans with roast profiles that match your brewing method. 'Filter' roasts are roasted to a lesser degree to allow more citric and fruity flavours. Espresso roasts are roasted to a higher degree to balance the acidity and accentuate nutty and chocolate flavours when extracted under pressure. They have chosen fluid bed roasting (hot-air) to get the best out of every bean. Hot-air roasting has very accurate and precise heat control for perfect roasts, batch after batch. The beans are roasted in a clean, smoke free chamber that produces a bright flavour profile.



## Heathrow Airport Consultations and Proposals January 2019

## Jerry Houdret writes:

Heathrow Airport has launched its second consultation focused on "Airspace and Future Operations." They are seeking feedback on their proposals until 4th March 2019 and ask for input from the public. I know this is a bit close to your receiving your magazine, but you can also go to one of their "Comments Meetings".

If you visit https://afo.heathrowconsultation.com/ you will find a postcode checker and online response tool that can be used to see which of the design envelopes affect us. It shows that the Farnhams is positioned underneath 1 of these design envelopes. These design envelopes are a geographical area within which it is possible to position one or more flight-paths. It does not mean that final flight paths will be spread across the full width of the envelope. The envelopes have been divided to show the heights that aircraft could be flying at for that portion of the envelope. Given that the height of an aircraft affects the noise level experienced on the ground, they would expect aircraft will be flying higher. Over us this height varies between 1,000 and 4,000 feet. However it admits the noise level of at least 17 aircraft an hour will exceed the recommended levels. Plus all the other aircraft per hour!

To help, they have designed new flight paths and want to know whether there are any sites or locations within these envelopes that you think require special consideration by them in determining where future flight paths should be. They are aware that Wexham Park Hospital is under some of their design envelopes. They encourage all the public to provide feedback through their website.

Feedback, together with their design principles and technical requirements, will be used to develop their flight path options. These will be the proposed routes that aircraft will fly and they are planning to hold a further consultation on their preferred options in 2022.

Heathrow is also holding a number of consultation events throughout January and February should you require any more information. Dates and times can be found here - https://afo.heathrowconsultation.com/wp-content/uploads/sites/4/2018/12/1.-Community-Information-Leaflet.pdf.

It is really important for the future of our Farnhams patch that as many responses as possible are submitted within the next few weeks.

## The Garden in Spring

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**Eva Marzec** of Newleaf tells us what to do in our gardens over the spring.

"Awake, thou wintry earth - fling off thy sadness! Fair vernal flowers, laugh forth your ancient gladness!"

(Thomas Blackburn)

Finally, the first month of spring is here after yet another long winter. March is the cusp of the gardening year – days become longer and lighter, the ground is warming up and our gardens are starting to burst into life in earnest. Bulbs are brightening up our landscapes and paving the way for early-flowering shrubs and other beautiful blooms and blossoms that will soon be erupting in our gardens.

March winds can still be bitterly cold but help to dry out the soil after any snow and winter rain. Sharp frosts can also still be a threat, despite deceptively mild sunshine and clear blue skies on some days. Even though there still might be some confusion from Mother Nature, we know that everything is nonetheless coming back to life. There is a Chinese Proverb which tells us this, that "Spring is sooner recognized by plants than by men."

Towards the end of the month the clocks go forward, prolonging our daylight hours, providing more opportunity (and less of an excuse!) to spend time out in the garden, however fickle the weather may still be.

## Spring Tasks:

- 'Spring clean' the garden. If nothing else, this
  is the one job to prioritise. Systematically
  work through beds and borders from back
  to front lightly turn the soil in between
  plants, gather and remove any last leaves,
  odd bits of plant debris and even slugs and
  snails. Weed and cut back any remaining
  perennials from last year. Remove weeds
  and moss from paths, patios and drives.
- Mulch. Top-dress beds and borders with a generous layer of good organic matter,

- such as well-rotted manure, home-made garden compost or bark chips. Mulching is a beneficial and labour-saving habit to get into it smothers out annual weeds, holds in moisture and reduces evaporation, saving on watering
- Prune roses. Generally, cut out any dead, diseased and dying wood, crossing, rubbing and weak branches. Prune to outwardfacing buds to encourage an open habit and remember the rule that the harder you prune, the more vigorous the subsequent growth will be.
- Prune shrubs. Many shrubs need a good cutting down in March to either induce them to produce new flowering growth, to keep them compact in habit or to produce bright stems for the next winter season. Do not shy away from hard-pruning. As a general rule, if a shrub is fast-growing or late-flowering, you can be brave with the secateurs. For example, Caryopteris, Cornus, Fuchsia, Lavatera, and Buddleia are all kept neater with hard pruning. Late flowering Clematis can also be cut back now.
- Protect young, tender shoots. Hostas and Delphiniums are particularly susceptible to slug damage so be on guard early – prevention is invariably better than cure! Consider using biological control or wildlife and environmentally friendly options, lessening negative impact.
- Tend to lawns. Start active lawn care. Give lawns their first, high cut, re-seed bare patches, apply a first feed towards the end of the month and deal with wormcasts. Worms are at their most active now, with their nuisance activity peaking. Break up wormcasts with a besom broom or wire rake and spread over the lawn, as this is, after all, worm manure. Tackle moss by raking out manually or hiring a scarifier for larger lawns. Afterwards the lawn may look awful for a time but take heart; it will soon recover and look better than ever

 Deadhead daffodils but leave the foliage alone, however unsightly!

- Plant. Most of us have gaps in the garden that need filling. March and April are wonderful months for planting, allowing plants to establish well before the summer ahead. Mid March is the deadline for planting any bare-root stock.
- Start 'growing your own'. The trend for home-grown edibles – vegetables, fruit and herbs - continues to grow in popularity.
   Create a dedicated area if you have the space. However, even the smallest garden can accommodate certain crops either in pots, containers, baskets or even in existing beds alongside ornamental plants, so there is no excuse for not making our gardens productive as well as pretty! Onions, shallots, garlic and new potatoes can all be started now.

Trying to keep my article concise for this season, I found myself struggling over and over, reluctantly having to omit tasks and tips. Then it dawned on me why I was finding it so difficult to keep things short and sweet – there is simply so much to be doing in the garden in spring that, however much time we all think we have, we rarely manage to fit it all in! So, with March winds finally blowing away the winter cobwebs, both physically and metaphorically,



let's enjoy any possible moment out in our spring gardens – even with our extra daylight hour, most of us will still find there aren't enough hours in the day for all the gardening we need to do!

After a long winter, we should all make time to reacquaint ourselves with our gardens – it is well worth the effort and the simple beauty of a spring garden bursting into life is enough to lift anyone's spirits. In the words of Winifred Mary Letts:

"That God once loved a garden we learn in Holy Writ And seeing gardens in the Spring I well can credit it".

## Charles Warner Memorial Trust Report: Raleigh International Borneo Expedition

Over the summer **Katie Somerville** took part in the last ever expedition that Raleigh International undertook in Sabah, northern Borneo, and here she shares an account of her exciting adventures. The 10-week expedition consisted of three phases: a trek, an environmental project and a community project.

### Trek phase in the Crocker Range

Trek was the most physically challenging of the phases, but very enjoyable and personally rewarding. We walked 80km through the rainforest over 16 days, setting up a different camp each night. A typical day began at 5:30am, camp would be taken down, and we'd walk for 2-6 hours. On arrival at the next site, camp would be set up for that day – this included collecting and purifying water, putting up hammocks and tarps, digging a toilet, setting up the radio and collecting firewood and building a fire – before

cooking dinner on the fire and getting an early night. Improving our teamwork and leadership skills was an important part of trek – each day a different person would be day leader, delegating jobs to the most suitable people to ensure they were all completed. The conditions were very challenging, especially on steep terrain with appalling weather, however the challenges we overcame brought us closer as a team.

## Environmental phase in the Danum Valley Conservation Area

Danum Valley Conservation Area (DVCA) is a 438 km2 area of primary rainforest. It has a stunning diversity of wildlife, some of which can only be found there, along with 10 primate species including orangutans!

When we visited, we helped with setting camera traps to collect data about wildlife in DVCA, and with the construction of a suspension bridge which Raleigh has been building for the last 5 years. This consisted of carrying 50kg bags of cement, collecting water and gravel from the river, and filling the foundations of the bridge with the concrete mixture. When completed, the bridge will give the conservation area better access, so that DVCA can apply to become a UNESCO World Heritage Site. If attained this would mean that it is legally protected by international treaties. Animals can also use the bridge, creating a wildlife corridor.

### Community phase in Kampung Mempakad

Kampung Mempakad is a small rural village surrounded by palm oil plantations (the main source of income) and home to around 140 people. Before Raleigh arrived, there were no toilets or running water – the closest water source was a spring about a 30-minute uphill walk away. Sometimes, water also had to be bought in for 20 ringgit (£4) per 200 litres.

Raleigh worked in Mempakad for a total of nine weeks over the summer in partnership with the PACOS Trust, with sponsorship from Coca-Cola, and built a gravity-fed water supply system and 3 toilets.

Working closely with the villagers of Mempakad, my group built the third toilet, dug over pipelines and connected them to houses, and held a waste management presentation to raise awareness

about how to correctly dispose of rubbish—the majority of waste there is burnt, including large quantities of plastic. As we were the last group to work in Mempakad, we completed the project, making the whole experience extremely satisfying and rewarding. It also meant that we held an opening ceremony for the toilets and pipes, a day filled with traditional dancing, food and karaoke!

My time in Borneo was an eye-opening experience, and I have made friends across the world. It has hugely impacted the way I live my life now I'm back at home and at university – I make an effort to avoid plastics wherever possible and

to reduce the amount of waste I produce. After living in a village where water was such a scarce resource, I no longer take it for granted, and the same can be said for energy, which I try to conserve as much as possible.

It was amazing to see how the work we completed is making a real difference people's lives, allowing communities to develop in a better way, conserving wildlife and contributing to scientific research. The funds provided by the Charles Warner Memorial Trust made an extremely generous contribution to my fundraising target of £3,450, so I'd like to thank the committee for their decision to support my expedition to Borneo.

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
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#### Birds, Birds, Birds!

**Miranda Krestovnikoff**, TV presenter, author, and President of the Royal Society for the Protection of Birds, came to talk to a large audience in St John's Farnham Common, ahead of the Big Garden Birdwatch weekend in January.

My life is certainly not a long novel - it's a collection of short stories. I have been filming short format films for COAST and The One Show for the last 12 years. I love sharing my passion and enthusiasm for wildlife with an audience, and none better than the home crowd in the village where I grew up, Farnham Common, in their "Buzz Talks" series. Being RSPB president and talking the day before their Big Garden Birdwatch Weekend, I just had to talk about birds.

I'm not what you'd describe as a "birder" but the thing about birds is that they are ubiquitous - even if it's just a pigeon in your garden or a crow flying overhead - we are surrounded by birds and the British certainly have a bit of a love affair with these feathery creatures. I have been incredibly lucky in the past few years to have filmed lapwings inside a prison, immersed myself in the chilly waters around Bass Rock with gannets dive-bombing all around me and held a "puffling" - the chick of my favourite bird - the charismatic puffin. When you start to delve into the lives of birds - you realise how fascinating they are and how much better they are than us at most things. Kestrels are able to hover motionless over their prey at a height of 20m before swooping down with pinpoint accuracy, ducklings are able to communicate with each other even when they are inside the egg, in order to co-ordinate hatching.

But they all need our help - most bird species in the UK are in decline and my beloved puffins made it onto the endangered list recently. We can all do our bit by putting out food and water in our gardens, keeping cats in at night and supporting wildlife conservation organisations who help fund scientific research into species monitoring and habitat protection.



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


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#### **REMAP**

An archer is firing arrow after arrow into the centre of the target, but more importantly he's doing it whilst sitting on a tripod stool. Roger is an engineer who takes great pride in producing REMAP products of the highest quality and it was great to watch him talking to John Walker MBE and double Paralympic Gold medallist about the benefit of the design he'd produced. Prior to an accident John was himself an engineer. He understands the precision required to take the weight and provide a stable platform to shoot from. Its lightweight construction is intentional, as John often flies off to International competitions and faces the same issues of luggage allowance as the rest of the passengers. The prototype stool helped Kerys Knight win Gold at the Invictus Games.

It's our December Panel meeting (we meet once a month at Amersham Hospital - a dozen or so engineers, Speech and

Language and Occupational Therapists, plus myself and our Treasurer). The engineers are playing with Derek's solution to a Health & Safety problem. The rest of us are just speechless that a bed bound gentleman can re-visit his much loved hobby and use his train set on his bed with a ceiling mounted board to raise and lower it. Will it make a difference to the gentleman's long term health prospects? – No, but it will give him a fresh interest in life.

Malcolm has brought in an arm rest for a young man with profound learning difficulties. The arm rest has allowed his fingers to relax and control the touch pad of his microcomputer system much more effectively.

Tom and Alan have picked up a case involving modifying a child's cot so a grandparent can contribute to child care support for her family.

Inam has signed up to a bathroom problem. He's only just finished work on a tray for a wheelchair. Morton is modifying a drink holder for a different client. Roger has just completed a project to link a baby buggy to a wheelchair for a soon to be mother (the photo shows her with her care dog).

Les is our chairman – he's currently working on guidance to the owners of a House Boat; building a ramp for a client with Parkinson's to safely enter and leave the home, and helping with a bed raiser.



A number of our engineers are working collaboratively on a virtual reality feature for a project with PACE which will enable young children to practice and be assessed as competent users of electric wheelchairs using a simulator that rotates, tilts and swivels – and has involved most of the team over the past 12 months.

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## Hedgerley Historical Society

For our first event in the Spring programme we welcome back popular local historian and writer **Julian Hunt** to present the Harry Kirby Memorial Lecture talk on Lord Austin and Lord Nuffield – Giants of the British Motor Industry on Wednesday 20th March 2019 at 8pm.

During the first half of the 20th century the British motor industry saw a struggle for supremacy between Herbert Austin and William Morris. Austin designed and built every part of his motor cars at Longbridge, whilst Morris bought in the cheapest components and assembled them at Cowley. When the two firms merged in 1952 to form the British Motor Corporation, Lord Austin had died and William Morris, now Lord Nuffield, was appointed chairman, but the real power was William Lord, a former manager at Cowley who had moved to Longbridge in the 1930s. The talk will feature the personal rivalry between Austin and Morris and how it produced radically different approaches to car manufacture and marketing.

We will then have a talk on Beatrix Potter Saturday 6th April 2019 at 8pm presented by Anney Harris

Like many people Anney Harris was introduced to Beatrix Potter's stories as a small child. However,her real interest in Beatrix Potter began in 1975 when she was appointed the Mark Longman Librarian at the National Book League (now called The Book Trust), which also included the Linder Collection of original Beatrix Potter art and first editions.

During her five years at the NBL, Anney Harris set up displays of the original watercolours and drawings, and talked to visiting groups of students about Beatrix Potter. She also had the opportunity of taking some of her original artwork and presenting talks in the USA in 1974 for the exhibition at New York University's Grey Art Gallery and later to Boston and Philadelphia.

Just after leaving the NBL and having given birth to her first son, Anney hosted a meeting in her dining room at The Dolls House, Teddington for a group of other professionals working with Beatrix Poitter's art or books. This group formed the first committee and launched the Beatrix Potter Society in the Spring of 1980. Anney was the first Secretary and has remained a member over the last 38 years, during most of which she has continued to work as a librarian.

Having retired in 2018 Anney now has a little more time to give illustrated talks and help to spread awareness of Beatrix Potter's remarkable life and the wide range of her achievements as well as the many areas that her legacy still influences.

On the 17th April 2019 we welcome Sarah Stockdale who will describe the life and work of Jane Austen

For many people, mention Jane Austen and the mind defaults to Mr Darcy, Elizabeth Bennet and a polite world of balls and conversation. However, Miss Austen's novels are firmly grounded in her personal experiences and these ranged between the luxurious comfort of her brother's home at Godmersham Hall and the penury of being a dependant living in hired rooms

The Real World of Jane Austen takes an affectionate and eclectic look at what the life of the middling classes was really like, by drawing on Jane Austen's life and major novels which are more autobiographical than is commonly thought.

What were the fashions of the day? What was the reality of travel? Their diet and mealtimes?

By answering these and other social questions I hope that a particularly interesting moment in history, when society was on the cusp of plunging into the consequences of industrialisation will come to life.

Sarah Stockdale has had a passionate interest in our country's history since childhood which she pursued through university and on into the classroom as a teacher. Sarah changed direction years ago and became a living historian which means that she looks at the way we lived in the past through stories, activities and literature. So often history has been killed in the classroom where it is seen as a sequence of political events. Sarah tries to re imagine how people lived, solved problems and responded to events around them and covers a number of periods, from the mid bronze age, through the medieval and Tudor to the late Georgian and Victorian times, focussing primarily on the skills and jobs of women.

Then on 1st May Prof Sir Frederick Floud will present Costing the earth: Bucks & English Gardens since 1660

The gardens of Buckinghamshire and surrounding counties are world-famous: Stowe, Wotton, Blenheim, Waddesdon, Painshill etc. etc. But how much did they cost to make and to maintain? Who paid for them and where did their money come from? How do they fit in to the evolution of the gardening industry? This lecture discusses gardening as part of the economic and social history of our county and of the country as a whole.

Roderick Floud is an economic historian, who has taught at Cambridge, Stanford and London Universities; he has also been Vice-Chancellor of London Metropolitan University, President of Universities UK and, most recently, Provost of Gresham College London. His research has embraced technical change and the history of nutrition and the human body, but he has

recently completed An Economic History of English Gardens, which will be published by Penguin later in 2019.

Rob Wassell will visit us on the 15th May to describe the history of Belle Tout Lighthouse at Beachy Head. The talk will include the need for a lighthouse, its construction and



recent movement due to coastal erosion. Rob will also cover the history of the Beachy Head lighthouse and life as a lighthouse keeper.

On Saturday 19 May at 8pm Anne Fletcher will present a talk about Joseph Hobson Jagger: The 'Man who broke the bank at Monte Carlo.' who is the subject of her book published in 2018.

Local author and historian Anne Fletcher, Jagger's great-great-great niece will talk about her search for her ancestor's story and how newly discovered sources and the assistance of local history societies helped her prevent his extraordinary life from being lost to history.

# Singing for the Brain at St Paul's Cathedral

Singing for the Brain is a social activity run by the Alzheimer's Society for people with dementia and their carers, writes Sally Pierce. It is based around the principles of music therapy and singing and provides a stimulating and uplifting time for everyone. For many it is their best day of the week.



Nature herself provides one of the best solutions to many garden crimes. For instance you can create an impenetrable hedge, which looks far more attractive than security fencing but is just as effective.

Planting prickly shrubs around vulnerable windows can also serve as a deterrent to the burglar. By careful planning you can produce a beautiful garden and reduce the risk of being the next victim of garden crime

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
#### **Book Review:**

#### I am, I am, a memoir by Maggie O'Farrell - seventeen brushes with death

Maggie O'Farrell, born in Northern Ireland, is the Author of seven award winning literary titles. This memoir is her first 'reluctant' venture into non-fiction writing, published in 2017.

Mother of three children, her daughter was born with a severe immunology disorder, making her allergic to a host of products and situations which require hospitalization around a dozen times a year. This memoir of Maggie's own near death experiences was written to allow Maggie to come to terms with this fact and to help her daughter in later life to better understand her debilitating condition.

Each incident reads like a self contained essay, some taken lightly, others lingering and life changing. The stories are dated and named after a certain part of the body with an accompanying anatomical drawing. The



incidents range from a childhood illness confining her to bed for two years and from which she was not expected to recover; a bravado teenage leap from a deep harbour wall; a mismanaged labour in an understaffed hospital; a near drowning in Africa; a plummeting plane; and a shocking encounter with a murderer on a remote Scottish mountain path.

We see Maggie as a child, student, traveller, wife and mother as the stories cover her life from 1975 up to the present day, the incidents being gathered from notebooks that Maggie has kept from a very early age. The last story about Maggie's daughter's severe allergies is particularly pertinent with several recent tragic cases reported in the National Press.

According to various interviews Maggie was reluctant to accept an advance from her publishers for this book and in fact only received one penny, as she felt she might not be able to complete and submit this very personal account of her experiences.

A thoughtful, resilient read which contains no self pity yet makes one aware of life's diverse luck. It recognises that these 'near misses' must surely change one's perception of mortality. The Book Group shared some of their own past experiences of 'survivor's tales', some bad luck, others lapsed judgements, some sad ones, as we recognised the fragility of life and how difficult it is to talk about mortality.

This book was a brave departure from Maggie's usual genre and 'I am, I am, I am' deservedly went on to become the Book of the Year with The Times, The Sunday Times, The Irish Times, The Telegraph and The Guardian, and was highly recommended by Zoë Ball Book Club reads. Maggie is currently working on her latest novel but has not totally put aside the writing of any future on-fiction titles.

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#### From the Archives

**Elisabeth Mills** writes: We are finishing looking through back copies of the parish magazine for 1952 with news in the September edition of the Wilder Memorial Window in St. John's Church, Farnham Common:

'On Sunday, August 17th, the Wilder Memorial Window was unveiled. The window has been given by Mr. Henry Wilder in memory of Henry Charles and Cicely Helen Wilder, his mother and father.



The Revd. Henry Charles Wilder was Rector of Farnham Royal from 1891 to 1908, and it was through his endeavours that the money was raised to build the church of St. John the Evangelist in place of the small mission church which was then at Farnham Common. This church was enlarged in 1924 but is still incomplete. The tower was left unfinished and it was also planned to have a south aisle and chapel. No doubt future generations will one day do this. We in our time have added the Parsonage House.

'The Wilder Window was designed by William Morris and Company. The middle light has as its centre a picture of the aged St. John meditating on the Holy City, the New Jerusalem'.

Moving on to January, 1954, the Rector, the Revd. Charles Warner, gives news of an extension to the churchyard at St. Mary's Farnham Royal. He says 'this has been an urgent necessity and the Parochial Church Council has already taken the preliminary steps to secure this extension. Dare we breathe it – this involves yet further heavy expenditure. The New Year, therefore, must bring in New Money'.

By May considerable progress had been made and it was planned that the land would be consecrated in the early autumn and then be ready for use.

Finally this time, in September there is news that an architect's report showed that extensive repairs were urgently required to the Farnham Common Village Hall if it was to remain in use. The Hall Council of Management had decided that it would be a waste of money to repair the main iron building, and it was proposed to repair the old reading room, which was brick built, and to build a new main hall on the site of the old one.

'This, of course, means money, much money. Phase 1 will cost £300,000 and Phase 2 up to £6,000.00. The first target has been reached and enquiries made concerning grant aid from sundry sources for Phase 2'.

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#### Moroccan Cinnamon Spiced Chicken Dwez

On a visit to her friend's house for lunch, **Sanita Sharma** was enchanged by the aromatic smell of her cooking. To her delight it was her Moroccan Cinnamon Spiced Chicken Dwez.

My friend's family are from Morocco and she explained that in her culture any quarrel can be resolved once this dish is cooked. It's what bring us together. She laughed and told me that food is the heart of her culture, it's what everyone talks about, a little like how we talk about weather in this country!

A Dwez is a popular dish cooked all over Morocco. It's popular because of the delicate balance of flavours you can create from a handful of spices and simple ingredients. It is also super easy to make, it's a one pot dish which can be enjoyed with rice or cous cous and is a firm favourite because of how easy it is to make.



#### Method

In a large non stick pot gentle fry the onions in olive oil over a medium heat stirring until soft.

Add the chopped coriander, cook over a low heat for a minute. Add the chopped carrots and return the lid on the pot over a low heat. Add the spices and chicken and stir thoroughly. Make up some chicken stock with a pint of water. Add the saffron to the chicken stock and pour into the pot.

You will need enough liquid to cover the chicken and vegetables. Cover with a lid and cook on a low/medium heat for half an hour. Check to see if it's cooked, if not allow a further 10-15 minutes.

#### National Bike Week 8-16th June 2019

Property marking is one of many ways that residents can help the police in reducing bicycle theft by ensuring your bike is securely locked when leaving it out in public and not leaving it insecure at home.

Chiltern District Council and South Bucks District Council are encouraging residents to be more conscious of how secure their bikes are and if they haven't already, get them property marked to reduce the risk of theft. Whilst some bicycles are returned to their owners, for some it's impossible to reunite the bike with its rightful owner because the bike has no identifiable markings on them, or no recorded details such as frame serial numbers and size, make, model, colour or even a photo.

Bike marking is a quick, easy and inexpensive solution to the problem. A simple sticker with your postcode on, stuck to the inside of your bike frame, will inform the police of ownership.

To support the National Bike Week Campaign, Chiltern & South Bucks Community Safety Team will be providing bicycle security marking labels to local residents. If you would like a bike label, please contact communitysafety@chiltern.gov.uk with 'bike label' in the subject line or call us on 01494 586535.



As well as marking your bike there are other ways of preventing and reducing the risk of bike theft:

- Keep your bike in a locked garage or shed, as more than half of bike thefts take place from the victims' properties.
- Always lock your bike when you are leaving it, use a strong lock and secure it to a bike rack where
  possible; as thieves can lift bikes over signposts especially if the lock is loose.
- There are other ways to identify your bike, such as recording and registering it on https://www. bikeregister.com/ or investing in an electronic tagging system.

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#### SBDC Beat the Burglary

Chiltern and South Bucks Community Safety Partnership is urging people to take a few minutes in January to security mark any valuable new items they may have received as gifts or bought over Christmas.

Many residents will have been lucky enough to have been given iPads, tablets, cameras, new games consoles and new bikes for Christmas, all of which are desirable to thieves. Marking property ensures it can be returned to its rightful owner in the event of it being recovered after a burglary. It also acts as a deterrent to thieves by making the items harder to sell on.

Items should be marked on the back or underneath with a postcode and house number using an ultra violet (UV) pen which are available in most DIY stores.

Larger items, such as bikes, scooters or machinery can be permanently marked using an engraver or etching kit.

Using forensic marking products such as SmartWater and Selecta DNA are also a highly effective way to mark property. A liquid solution is applied giving items either a chemical or DNA code depending on the product used, which is unique to the owner. The solution cannot be seen by the naked eye and is incredibly difficult to remove. It glows under ultraviolet light, allowing the police to detect it.

Chiltern District Councillor Liz Walsh, Cabinet Member for Healthy Communities says: "Property marking is by far the best way to protect your valuables such as jewellery, laptops and antiques. If it's expensive, it's desirable so please get it marked."

South Bucks District Councillor Patrick Hogan, Portfolio Holder for Healthy Communities says: "Unfortunately Christmas offers a lot of opportunities for burglars, bikes and electronic items are worth a lot of money to opportunist thieves, but there are some simple steps people can take to reduce their chances of falling victim.

"A few minutes spent marking your valuables and registering them on Immobilise.com is time well-spent. You stand a much better chance of getting your item back in the unfortunate event of it being lost or stolen."
